On March 22, Green Campus hosted a Water Awareness Speaker Panel that brought together local water experts to discuss local, national, and global water issues. The speakers included: Beth Werner from Humboldt Baykeeper, Jacob Pounds from the Blue Lake Rancheria Tribe, Jennifer Savage from the Ocean Conservancy and Andrew Stubblefield a HSU Professor. Each of the speakers discussed different topics, but all presentations were interrelated.



Beth Werner spoke about the Clean Water Act's history and its 40th anniversary this year. Her presentation inspired the audience to advocate our rights to drinkable, swimmable, and fishable water this year by signing petitions and contacting Congress. Next, Andrew Stubblefield spoke about the Clean Water Act and gave information about nonpoint source pollution. His presentation was very informative and included various topics relating to water quality, habitat restoration, and global climate change.

Jennifer Savage's presentation, "Beneath the Surface", was about the Marine Life Protection Act proposed by the Ocean Conservancy. She has worked with numerous stakeholders to create Marine Protected Areas along California's North Coast. These protected areas are determined by scientists and locals to determine areas that are threatened by pollution and marine disturbance. They will expand down the California coast and are the first Marine Protected Areas in the country.

Facts About Water

In today's world, many of us exist separately from the environment from which our ancestors came. The modern convenience of homes, roads, and classrooms detaches us from the resources that sustain our lives. This past March, Water Awareness Month, was a chance for many to acknowledge and learn about water as one of these vital resources.

Water is an incredible substance. It is the most common molecule on Earth making up about ¾ of the Earth's surface as well as about ¾ of our body weight. Despite being so ubiquitous, most of the planet's water is unusable to humans, as saltwater or frozen in glaciers and many millions of people struggle daily to have enough. Here in Humboldt County, the Ruth Lake and Mad River watershed more than meets our water demands. However, reducing excess water consumption is an important step towards sustainability especially as climate change may reduce water's availability.

Here are a few tips to reduce water consumption in your home.

- 1. Use a shower timer: We all love a hot shower, but aiming for five minutes and not exceeding ten minutes is an exercise in sensibility.
- 2. **Turn off the water when not in use:** Many people have stopped the wasteful practice of letting the water run while shaving or brushing their teeth. Take it a step further and turn off the flow while you scrub the dishes or while soaping up in the shower.
- 3. When using dish or clothes washers, **wash full loads**: these appliances use the same amount of water no matter the capacity.
- 4. Set up a **rainwater catchment system** for your home: This can be as simple as a few large tanks with a hose attached to the bottom, which is great for watering plants.
- 5. Only flush the toilet when necessary: On an average day in the United States, the toilet uses more water than the shower.
